

Graduating Graduate Student Survey Results Summer 2021, Fall 2021, and Spring 2022

Executive Summary

Overall, the survey had a **31.9% response rate**. 65.0% applied for a **Master's degree**, and the **Master of Social Work** was the most frequently reported graduate program of study (20).

For post-graduation plans, 71.7% anticipated **full-time paid employment** and 18.3% anticipated **searching for employment**; 3.4% anticipated **further graduate or professional school**. Among those who anticipated full-time or part-time employment, 82.6% anticipated that their employment would be **directly related to their graduate degree(s)**. For those who anticipated employment for their primary post-graduation plans, salaries were most often estimated to be **\$100,000 or more** (30.4%) and **\$40,000 to \$49,999** (21.7%).

Type of program available (36.7%) was the primary reason to attend Washburn; 73.3% would **definitely choose college again,** and 55.9% would **definitely choose Washburn again**. Graduates also rated the quality of their Washburn education as **very good** (61.7%).

For the extent to which Washburn prepared them in relation to USLOs, graduates felt most prepared in the area of **Critical Thinking** (89.8%).

When asked if they had completed an **internship**, **clinical**, **or practicum** while enrolled at Washburn, 83.3% **had participated**, of which, 95.3% stated it was a **requirement for their degree**. **USD 501 Topeka Public Schools** was the most frequently reported location (3).

In regard to working for pay, most reported **not working any hours** at an on campus job (83.8%); 44.1% reported working **more than 30 hours per week** off campus.

For factors limiting the ability to focus on education, **Employment** was most often selected both as the top ranked issue (23.9%) and as one of the top 3 factors (21.4%). For factors that increased or improved the ability to focus on education, 34.8% selected **Friend Mentoring/Support** as the top factor and 23.4% ranked it as one of the top 3 factors.

When asked how they would change their habits to better focus on their studies if they could start their Washburn experience over again, the most frequent responses out of 36 total were that they would have worked less or not at all (9) and that they would not have changed any habits (7).

For advice they would give to an incoming graduate student wanting to know how best to take advantage of Washburn's educational opportunities, **connect with professors** (11) was the most frequently stated theme from the 34 responses to the question.

Finally, when asked for additional comments about their Washburn experience, 9 of the 13 respondents expressed generally positive comments about Washburn/graduate experience.

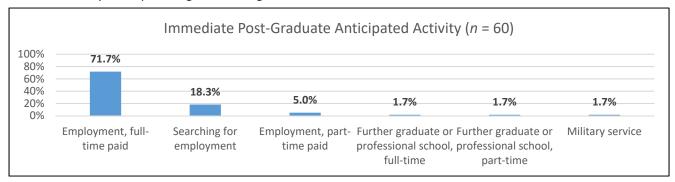
Introduction

This report provides results from the Graduating Graduate Student Survey, administered electronically to graduate students who applied for graduation in Summer 2021, Fall 2021, and Spring 2022. The survey instrument is located at the end of this report, pages 10-13.

Of the graduate students who graduated in Summer 2021 (21), Fall 2020 (23) and Spring 2022 (144), for a total of 188, 60 responded to the survey, for a response rate of 31.9%. Of these 60 respondents, 65.0% applied for a Master's Degree, 21.7% applied for a Post-Graduate Certificate, and 13.3% applied for a Doctorate Degree. Of the 59 who responded, the most reported graduate degrees were Master of Social Work (20) and Post Grad Certificate- Psychiatric Mental Health Care Nurse Practitioner (9). These results do not include students who applied for graduation from the School of Law.

Post-Graduation Plans

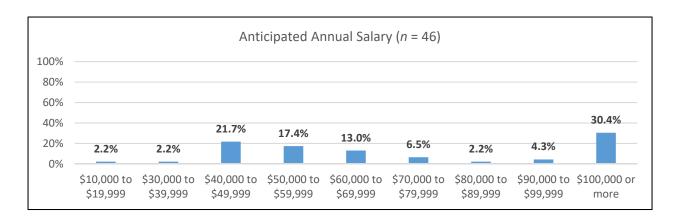
Of the 60 students who answered the following statement: "Please indicate ONE activity that you anticipate will be your PRIMARY activity in the period immediately following graduation," the following chart shows "Employment, full-time paid employment" as the most frequent response (71.7%) and "Searching for employment" as the second most frequent response (18.3%). For the 3.4% who indicated their plans were further graduate or professional school, full-time or part-time, one respondent indicated they were pursuing Accounting and another stated DNP at Washburn.



Students who Anticipate Post-Graduation Employment



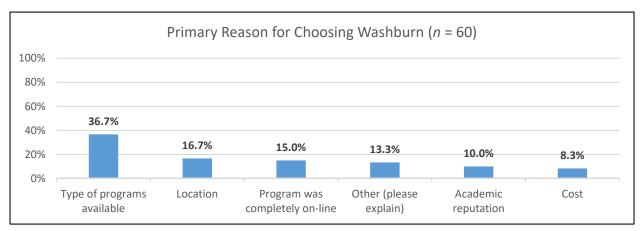
Among students who anticipated full-time or part-time employment as their primary post-graduation activity, 82.6% reported that their employment would be directly related to their graduate degree(s).



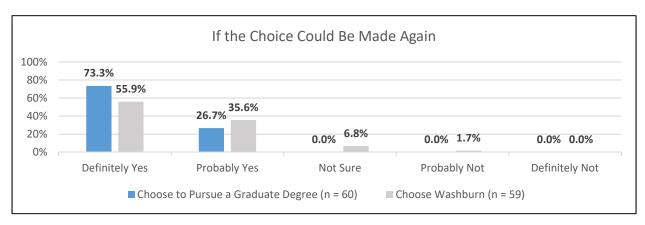
Students who reported their anticipated full-time or part-time employment (n = 46) most often reported their salary in the \$100,000 or more range (30.4%) or the \$40,000-\$49,999 range (21.7%).

Reasons to Attend Washburn

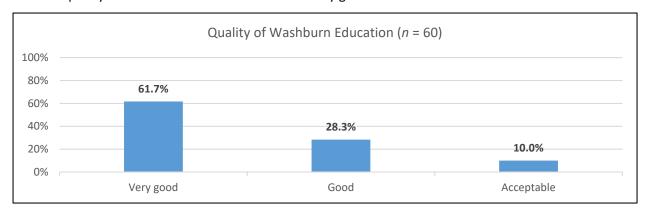
Respondents were asked to identify the primary reason why they chose to attend Washburn for their graduate studies, and, if given the choice, whether they would pursue a graduate degree again, whether they would choose to attend Washburn again, and how they would rate the quality of their graduate education at Washburn. The most frequent responses given for why they chose Washburn were "Type of programs available" (36.7%), "Location" (16.7%), and "Program was completely on-line" (15.0%). The Other reasons for attending Washburn (13.3%) can be found in the Appendix.



If the choice could be made again, 73.3% would definitely choose to pursue a graduate degree again and 55.9% would definitely choose Washburn again.

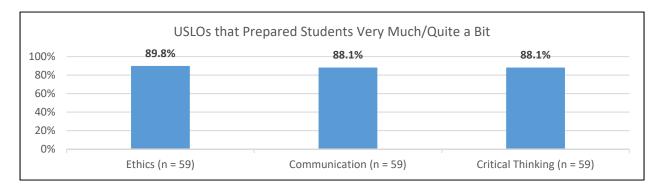


Regarding the quality of their graduate education at Washburn, 61.7% of survey respondents indicated that the quality of their Washburn education was very good.



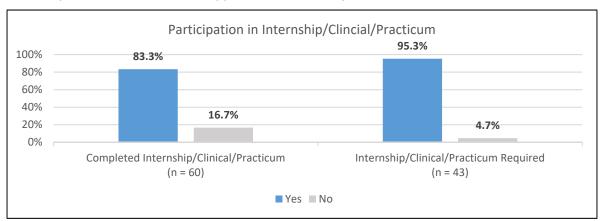
Student Learning Outcomes

Students were asked to rate the extent to which Washburn prepared them in terms of the university's student learning outcomes (USLOs), including the areas of communication, critical thinking, and ethics. Students responded that Washburn prepared them the most in the area of Ethics (89.8%), and Communication and Critical Thinking (88.1%) were the second and third highest areas of preparation.



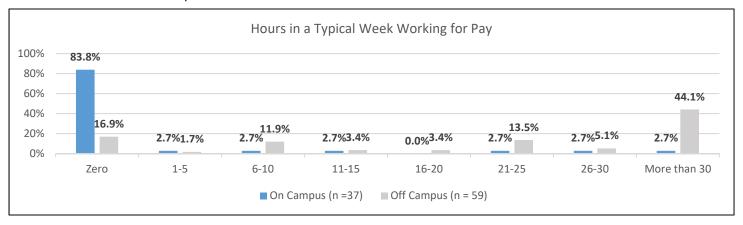
Participation in Internships, Clinicals or Practicums

When asked if they had completed an internship, clinical, or practicum while enrolled at Washburn, 83.3% responded affirmatively. Further, when asked if participation was required, 95.3% indicated yes. When asked at what organization they completed their internship, clinical, or practicum, three listed USD 501 Topeka Public Schools. See Appendix for other responses.



Working for Pay

Students were asked how many hours they spent working for pay, both on and off campus, in a typical week while enrolled at Washburn. For on campus work, 37 responded, and for off campus work, 59 responded. Most of the on campus responses (83.8%) reported working zero hours per week. In other words, the majority did not work on campus. For off campus work, about half (44.1%) reported working more than 30 hours per week.



Factors Limiting and Facilitating the Ability to Focus on Education

For the next two questions, students were asked to rank the top three factors that limited their ability to focus on their education and the top three factors that facilitated (increased or improved) their ability to focus on their education.

The following table shows that Employment was most often selected as the single most limiting factor (23.9%) and was also most frequently ranked in the top 3 limiting factors (21.4%). Family/Relationships and Commitments beyond the classroom were also frequently selected as the single most limiting factor (17.4%) and frequently ranked in the top 3 limiting factors (18.3% and 17.6%).

For factors that facilitated students' ability to focus on their education, the following table shows that Friend Mentoring/Support was most often selected as the single most helpful factor (34.8%), followed by Financial aid (30.4%). Friend Mentoring/Support was also the factor most frequently ranked in the top 3 (23.4%), followed by Financial Aid (20.7%).

Open-Ended Question Responses

Students were asked to respond to four open-ended questions. First, students were asked how they would change their habits to better focus on their studies if they could start their Washburn experience over again. Where more than one student gave the same response, the number of times it was listed is noted in parentheses. The following themes emerged from a review of the 36 respondents who commented:

- Work less/not at all (9)
- Would not change any of my habits (7)
- Better time management (6), do not procrastinate (3), better study habits (3), focus on studies (1), take better notes (1), use a planner (1)
- Adopt better self-care habits (3)
- Apply for scholarships (2)
- Negative comment about a professor (2)
- Better course schedule (1)
- Get involved more (1)
- Take classes in person (1)
- Work more (1)
- Apply for loans (1)

Second, students were asked what advice they would give to an incoming student who wanted to know how best to take advantage of Washburn's educational opportunities. The following themes emerged from a review of the 34 respondents who commented:

- Connect with professors (11)
- Use time management skills (5), plan ahead (5), work hard (2), stay focused (2), don't procrastinate (1), keep to a schedule (1)
- Find social support (6)
- Use campus resources (4)
- Ask questions (3), ask for help (3)
- Practice self-care (2), therapy (1), manage stress (1)
- Be proactive (1), be motivated (1), believe in yourself (1)
- Take advantage of opportunities (2), explore options (1)
- Negative comment about a professor (1)
- Balance priorities (1)
- Apply for scholarships (1)
- Choose your program carefully (1)
- Communicate with your advisor (1)
- Strive for mastery (1)
- Study groups (1)
- Take fewer classes per semester (1)
- You get what you put in (1)

The third open-ended question asked if any Washburn faculty or staff member(s) made a positive difference in their lives and in what way. These responses are provided to the academic dean by the VPAA's Office to be shared with faculty and staff.

For the final question, students were asked if they wanted to make any additional comments about their Washburn experience. The following themes emerged from the 13 responses:

- Generally positive comments about Washburn/graduate experience (9)
- Negative comment about financial aid office (1)
- On campus therapy was not available due to waitlist (1)
- Program should be offered fully online (1)
- Self-care should be taught as part of program (1)
