 - There should be some forms of information sharing to ensure that all Senate members are on the same page.
 - o The Scientific Literacy GenEd requirement is ambiguous. Do the current courses with the quantitative and scientific literacy USLO meet that requirement?
 - The term "Quantitative reasoning" should have been removed by the Scientific Literacy Subcommittee and General Education Committee, but somehow it remained and forwarded to the Academic Affair Committee.
 - o It was noted that the meeting of the General Education Committee on this requirement change was called on short notice and the NSD representatives could not attend due to teaching conflicts.
 - o NSD plan to articulate a suggestion to General Education Committee and the Academic Affair Committee regarding the new Scientific Literacy requirement.
 - O Jennifer Ball said that one course can go into multiple buckets, but students can only count once. Should we suggest that a course can only go into one specific bucket?

Rationale for offering this course

For decades, we have been subjecting all of our PH majors to a standard that is too high by requiring all of them to write a senior thesis. This has been a barrier to graduation. Not all barriers to graduation are such that they should be removed, but we firmly believe that this is the case now for this barrier. After a careful study of Kansas, Colorado, and Missouri institutions of public higher education, we found that only one philosophy undergraduate program required a senior thesis of all its majors. So now we are keeping PH 398 and PH 399 as is for Philosophy Program Honors candidates and removing PH 398 and PH 399 as requirements for non-Honors candidates. Honors candidates are those who both have a 3.5 overall GPA at the beginning of the senior year and an intention to finish with Honors by enrolling in PH 398 rather than PH 397. PH 397 will now be required of non-Honors candidates to graduate.

Arrange the papers in chronological order, starting from the beginning of your coursework; that way, we can observe growth and improvement as well as overall quality.

Mark each paper clearly as to course, instructor, semester, and year.

Include the instructor's original comments on the paper, if available.

At the end, include a short (500-750 word) self-assessment containing your own reflections on your development in the program and your overall level of satisfaction with the program.

The **outcomes** that this portfolio will assess include: **organization** (the portfolio exhibiting effective organizational skills in compilation of the portfolio), **completeness** (the portfolio meeting all requirements for portfolio contents), and **student reflection** (the portfolio revealing effective insight into the student's development over time in the program, as well as revealing the student's overall level of satisfaction with the program itself).

A capstone paper. This must include the following:

Reformulate the original thesis statement from the paper written in a previous course, a thesis statement that will now be appropriate for a work of considerable length (10-15 pps.).

Re-outline a detailed, well-integrated, and well-reasoned plan of what will be covered in the process of supporting the thesis statement, a plan that demonstrates mastery of the relevant literature.

Rearticulate the argument (or set of arguments) that supports the thesis statement, and develop new arguments that support the thesis statement.

Within the capstone paper itself, explain potential and plausible objections to the argument (or set of arguments) and then respond adequately to those objections, if this was not done in the original paper. If it was done in the original paper, then expand on said objections and responses.

Share the paper at a public event like Apeiron, a Philosophy Club presentation, or an undergraduate philosophy conference.

Your portfolio and thesis proposal will be graded, and at least a C is required to enroll in PH 399. The portfolio will be worth 40% of your grade, and the capstone paper will be worth 60% of your grade. The portfolio will be graded based upon the attached rubric.

Decrease the Natural Sciences concentration requirement for Bachelor of Science degrees from 20 hours in one department to 15 hours.

The main rationale is a student-centered one that provides more flexibility in taking a variety of courses in the students' interest and/or career goals. Primarily, dropping the hours from 20 to 15 hours in one department provides students an opportunity to take a greater variety of science courses for their NS concentration. For example, most B.S. biology students take 20 hours of chemistry, but their future goals might not need them to have 20 hours of chemistry. Thus, they would benefit by taking a course or two from

another science discipline that would help them after graduation. For example, they might choose to take a CM course in computer programming or another MA or PS course. The change is also likely to help students "double-dip" credit hours with some of the new interdisciplinary minors, especially the bioinformatics minor that is currently being developed.

It should be noted that both the departments of SO/AN and KN have stated that this change will not affect them.

Procedure for Third-Year Review of Tenure-Track Faculty

During the third year of a tenure-track appointment, untenured faculty in the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) will undergo a preliminary evaluation designed to monitor progress toward the award of tenure and promotion. The faculty member being reviewed will submit materials patterned after those in a petition for tenure and promotion, per the following guidelines. For those faculty who have been authorized to include years of prior faculty work experience as part of their pre-tenure probationary period, the "third year" review will occur at a different time:

- Faculty including one year of prior experience will have the review conducted during the fourth year of the probationary period, which will be their third year at Washburn.
- Faculty including two years of prior experience will have the review conducted during the fourth year of the probationary period, which will be during their second year at Washburn.
- Faculty including three years of prior experience will have the review conducted during the fifth year of the probationary period, which will be their second year at Washburn.

The third-year review process is similar but not identical to the tenure process. One notable difference is that the evaluation is not reviewed beyond the level of the dean.

- 1. The department chairperson will devise a review timeline that will enable the Third-year Review Evaluation Form to be transmitted to the CAS dean's office by **the Friday after Spring Break.** Suggested example timelines for the process of third-year review are available from the dean's office.
- 2. The department chairperson will assist the candidate in creating a department-level review committee that simulates a tenure-review committee. It shall consist of at least five tenured faculty members from the department. The department chairperson will notify the dean's office of the members of the departmental committee.
 - If the department lacks the necessary five members, the chair will assist the faculty member in submitting to the dean's office a list of higher-ranking members of other college departments. The list shall be at least twice the number lacking in the faculty member's department. The dean, in consultation with the College Promotion and Tenure committee (CCPT), will then select the final members of the committee. Committee members may not be members of the CCPT.
- 4. The candidate will select a willing chairperson from among the committee members. The department chairperson will not serve on the department-level committee.

- 4. The third-year review candidate will submit the required information and other materials in support of their review to the department chairperson in electronic format by the date the department chairperson has specified. The department chair will also share a copy of all materials with the dean's assistant.
- 5. The department committee will provide notification of its recommendation to the department chairperson along with supporting rationale. Any minority opinion within the department committee may be expressed in a signed, written statement to the department chairperson.
- The department chairperson will complete the form entitled "Third-Year Review of Tenure-Track Faculty" for the faculty member being reviewed. This form does not substitute for the "Yearly Evaluation of Faculty" form, which should also be completed for that faculty person at the appropriate time of the academic year. Under the three major headings of "Teaching," "Research, Scholarship, and Professional and Creative Activities" and "Service," the chairperson will summarize and evaluate the contributions of the faculty member being reviewed.

The chairperson will present and discuss the completed evaluation form, the departmental recommendation and rationale, and any written minority report(s) received from the departmental committee with the faculty member. The faculty member will then sign the evaluation form stating they have seen the evaluation and have had an opportunity to discuss it with the chairperson.

The department chairperson will share the following with the dean's assistant: 1) the completed evaluation form; 2) the department committee's recommendation and supporting rationale; and 3) any minority opinions.

- 7. The CCPT will review the candidate's supporting materials and all materials forwarded by the department chair and send a report to the dean.
- 8. After reviewing the materials and reports, the dean will sign the "Third-Year Review of Tenure-Track Faculty" and provide their summary evaluation to the faculty member, along with a copy of the CCPT's report.
- 9. All materials related to third-year review will be kept in the faculty member's electronic file maintained by the dean's office.
- If the third-year review process prompts in a decision of non-reappointment for the faculty member, the procedure for non-reappointment outlined in the Faculty Handbook will be followed.

PROCEDURE FOR THIRD-YEAR REVIEW OF TENURE-TRACK FACULTY

During the third year of a tenure-track appointment, untenured faculty in the College of Arts and Sciences will undergo a preliminary evaluation designed to monitor progress toward the award of tenure. The third-year review is supplementary to the annual performance review. For the third-year review, the faculty member being reviewed is expected to submit materials patterned after those in a petition for tenure. Guidelines for the preparation of the materials to be submitted are attached. For those faculty who have received one year of prior service credit, the review will be done during the fourth year of their credited service, which will be their third year at Washburn. For those who received two years of prior service credit, the review will also be done during the fourth year of their credited service, which will be during their second year at Washburn. Faculty who have received three years of prior service credit will not have a third-year review. The third-year review process is similar but not identical to the tenure process. One notable difference is that the evaluation is not reviewed beyond the level of the Dean.

- The faculty member's materials to be reviewed will be submitted to the department chairperson at the designated time.
 The Department Chairperson will devise a review timeline that will enable the Third-year Review Evaluation Form to be transmitted to the Dean's Office by the Friday after Spring Break (March 24, 2023).
- 2. The chairperson will create a department-level review committee that **simulates** a tenure-review committee. It shall consist of at least five tenured faculty members from the department, using outside members to fill out the group of five if an insufficient number of qualified faculty members is available. If the department lacks the necessary five members, the faculty member will submit to the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences a list of higher ranking members of other college departments. The list shall be at least twice that number lacking in the faculty member's department. The Dean, in consultation with the College Promotion and Tenure committee, then will select the final members of the committee. Outside members may not be members of the College Committee on Promotion and Tenure (CCPT). The chairperson will not serve on the department-level committee, but will receive its report.
- 3. The chairperson completes the form entitled "Third-Year Review of Tenure-Track Faculty" for each faculty member being reviewed in his/her department. **This form is in addition to the Yearly Evaluation of Faculty form.** Under the three major headings of "Teaching," "Research, Scholarship, and Professional and Creative Activities," an "Service," the chairperson will summarize and evaluate the contributions of the faculty member. Supporting materials assembled by the faculty member being evaluated will be attached.
 - In the event of a minority opinion in the department, the chairperson will inform the faculty member(s) voicing this opinion of their right to submit their opinion in a signed, written statement to the chairperson. Any such statement will be forwarded, by the chairperson, along with the evaluation forms by the departmental chairperson and the report of the department-level review committee.
- 4. The chairperson will recommend each faculty member being evaluated either for retention or non-retention. If the recommendation is for retention, the chairperson will indicate either that the person is making satisfactory progress toward tenure or that the person needs to accelerate his/her progress toward tenure. If the recommendation is for non-retention, the procedure for non-reappointment outlined in the Faculty Handbook is followed.
- 5. The chairperson will present and discuss the completed evaluations, as well as any minority report(s) if any, with the faculty member. The faculty member will then sign the form in the chairperson's presence, indicating that he or she has seen the evaluations and has had an opportunity to discuss it with the chairperson.
- 6. The chairperson will forward the evaluation form, along with the report of the department-level review, any additional documentation and/or minority report(s), to the Dean's Office for review by the CCPT and the Dean.
- 7. The CCPT will review the materials and send a report to the Dean.
- 8. After reviewing the materials and reports, the Dean will sign the "Third-Year Review of Tenure-Track Faculty" and provide a summary evaluation to the faculty member. The Dean will also provide the faculty member a copy of the CCPT's report.
- 9. The original copy of the evaluation forms will be kept in the faculty member's file in the dean's office. A photocopy will be returned to the department chairperson, to be filed in the faculty member's file in the departmental office.
- 10. The faculty member's submitted materials are returned after the review process is completed.

Example Timelines for Third-Year Reviews

This document aims to aid department chairs who are seeking guidance as they determine their internal timeline and intermediary deadlines for third-year reviews. For a detailed procedure guide, please refer to the "Procedure for Third-Year Review of the Tenure-Track Faculty" document.

Example 1

- Mid-January: Petitioner submits the names of potential committee members and committee chair to CAS.
- Mid-February: Petitioner submits third-year review materials. The materials should be submitted in digital form to the department chair. The department chair also shares a copy of all materials with the dean's assistant.
- Late February: The department-level review committee submits its report to department chair. (Note: the candidate does not get a copy of this report.) The department chair emails the departmental recommendation letter and any minority opinions to CAS dean's assistant.
- Late February/Early March: Department chair reviews committee report and completes "Third-Year Review of Tenure-Track Faculty" form and writes the department chair's letter of recommendation.
- First week of March: The department chair and candidate meet to discuss the department chair's evaluation as well as the department committee's recommendation (and minority opinion, if any). Both the faculty member and department chair sign the form "Third-Year Review of Tenure-Track Faculty."
- Before spring break (mid-March): The department chair shares the signed form, committee letter and
 any minority opinion to the dean's assistant. The dean's assistant notifies members of the CCPT. (The
 deadline to submit all materials to the CAS office is the Friday after spring break.)

Example 2

- Encourage candidate(s) to complete most of the third-year review work the summer preceding their review (or during that spring, if they are taking most of the summer off). Petitioner may add fall semester work in January.
- November or December: Petitioner submits the names of potential committee members and committee chair to CAS.
- February 1: Petitioner submits third-year review materials. The materials should be submitted in digital form to the committee chair and department chair. The department chair also shares a copy of all materials with the dean's assistant.
- Late February: The department-level review committee submits its report to department chair. (Note: the candidate does not get a copy of this report.) The department chair emails the departmental recommendation letter and any minority opinions to CAS dean's assistant.

- Early March: Department chair reviews committee report and completes "Third-Year Review of Tenure-Track Faculty" form and writes the department chair's letter of recommendation.
- Mid-March: Department chair and candidate meet to discuss the department chair's evaluation as well
 as the department committee's recommendation (and minority opinion, if any). Both the faculty
 member and department chair sign the form "Third-Year Review of Tenure-Track Faculty."
- Before spring break (mid-March) the department chair emails the signed form, committee letter and any minority opinion to the dean's assistant. The dean's assistant notifies members of the CCPT. (The deadline to submit all materials to the CAS office is the Friday after spring break.)
