GET THE COURSES YOU NEED

- French 101 Fall, 102 Spring
- Be sure to meet with your advisor to map both departmental and University graduation requirements.

- French 201 Fall, 202 Spring, and 207, 214
- Be sure to meet with your advisor to map both departmental and University graduation requirements.

- FR 311 Fall, 312 Spring and any core, elective, or correlated courses offered.
- Meet with your advisor to verify that you are progressing towards fulfilling all graduation requirements.

- FR 331 Fall, 400 Spring and any core, elective or correlated courses offered.
- In the fall verify that the courses you are taking will fulfill all requirements for graduation.

GET RELEVANT EXPERIENCE

- Join teams or clubs on campus such as: French Club, International Club. See the list of [registered student organizations](#).

- Volunteer for a leadership position in a campus club such as: French Club, International Club. See the list of [registered student organizations](#).

- As leader of a University club, actively promote and ensure continuity of such Club by increasing membership and club visibility through culturally enriching campus-wide activities.

- Transition leadership responsibilities in language related University clubs and other entities to the next generation of language students.
