Bods In (and Out of) the Classroom



Sociology major Andrew Orr was named **Hy-Vee Student-Athlete of the Week** in November! "He scored a total of 40 points as No. 10 Washburn men's basketball opened the season with a pair of double-digit wins. Orr scored 21 points on 9-11 shooting in the Ichabods' 89-71 season-opening win over the University of Sioux Falls on Nov. 8. He also scored 19 points and grabbed eight rebounds as the Ichabods played Minnesota State, the Division II national champions." Way to go Andrew!

Dr. Murphy and BA Anthropology student Beetle Hatch led an Archaeology lab as part of the annual "Women In Science Day" held on Washburn's campus on October 15, 2024. Seventh grade girls examined objects from the past, then practiced their interpretation skills by examining modern artifacts - or the "Garbology" of items left behind by folks in our Washburn community!





Guest Speakers on Campus

Students in Dr. Murphy's AN371 Archaeology Field & Laboratory Methods class had the opportunity to hear from two guest speakers. Dr. Nikki Klarmann, State Archeologist, presented "Moving Toward Compliance: New NAGPRA Regulations and What They Mean for the Kansas Historical Society," and Lisa LaRue Baker, Cherokee Nation and former Tribal Historic Preservation Officer, presented "Meaningful Consultation with Tribes." Both talks offered great insight into the future of the practice of archaeology; students applied what they learned to help guide their research and work at the Curtis Family Cemetery this semester.




SOAN Alumni Updates

Dr. Lindsey Ibanez

Dr. Ibañez was awarded a Small Research Grant for her research project titled: Homophily, Client Expectations and The Client-Therapist Relationship. Her research utilizes original survey and interview data she hopes to analyze during an upcoming sabbatical. In addition, Dr. Ibañez recently joined the board of Valeo Foundation which supports the activities of Valeo Behavioral Health Care in Topeka to address, mental illness, addiction, and homelessness.

Dr. Alexandra Klales

Dr. Klales and colleagues/co-PIs from Michigan State University, the University of North Texas Health Science Center, Texas State University, and the University of New Mexico, were awarded a \$2+ million U.S. Department of Justice, National Institute of Grant for their research project MOSAIC: Unifying Methods of Sex, Stature, Affinity, & Age for Identification through Computational Standardization. In addition, Dr. Klales published an article titled Sex estimation using metrics of the innominate: A test of the DSP2 method published in the Journal of Forensic Sciences. Finally, Dr. Klales was awarded a CAS professional development grant for summer 2025.

Dr. Ashley Maxwell

Dr. Maxwell and Co-PI Dr. Klales completed data collection for their NIJ grant "Empirical Analysis of Saw Mark Characteristics in Human Bone: Meeting Forensic Standards in Dismemberment Cases." In addition, Dr. Maxwell was awarded a professional development grant for summer 2025.

Dr. Jason Miller

Dr. Miller gave a paper titled: Fostering University / Community Partnerships One Neighborhood at a Time at the 2024 Tilford Conference on Multiculturalism. In addition, Miller spoke at the American Anthropological Association on a roundtable titled: Ethics and Risk in Anthropological Praxis: Navigating Socio-Political Landscapes and offers many workshops on campus related to Community-engaged learning. Finally, Dr. Miller was awarded a professional development grant for summer 2025.

Dr. Laura Murphy

Dr. Murphy attended the Geological Society of America Conference held in Anaheim, California, Sept. 22-24. She co-led a field trip to the Los Angeles La Brea Tar Pits and Museum titled "Exploration of North American Quaternary Geology at the La Brea Tar Pits" that had 27 participants. At the conference, she also presented a coauthored paper titled: "Refuting the sensational claim of a Hopewell ending cosmic airburst: Implications for pedagogy and public outreach." In addition, Dr. Murphy attended a workshop at the Oak Hill Cemetery in Lawrence to gain hands-on lessons in preserving historic cemeteries. Dr. Murphy shared what she learned with her AN 371 Field and Lab Methods In Archaeology course this fall where are students conducted research and preservation at the Curtis Family Cemetery in North Topeka.
