Description of how the problem or opportunity relates to the identified theme

As of Fall 2023, Washburn University had enrolled 365 Masters students and 60 Doctoral students in graduate programs, comprising 7.5% of enrollment. Despite accounting for a significant proportion of enrollment, funding for graduate students is severely limited, which in turn limits graduate students' success opportunities and pathways. For example, the Psychology Department is able to offer \$29,417 in the form of stipends and hourly wages (for 3-10 hours per week) to graduate students across 62 positions (31 for spring and 31 for fall). On average, the graduate students in the funded positions earn funded by this money earn \$992.93 per year. Although individual graduate students may earn more than this average, as they fulfill multiple positions, other graduate students earn less or nothing. Conversely, traditional graduate courses cost anywhere from \$485-\$925 per credit hour, depending on program and residency status. Clearly, the funding available is poor compared to the costs incurred. Continuing to use Psychology as an example, graduate students in the Masters Program are required to present their capstone (an empirical thesis or case study) to audiences external to the university. This communication is a basic component of the scientific method. However, presenting at even regional conferences is cost-prohibitive, with even just registration costs in the range of hundreds of dollars. Given these deficits in funding, graduate students are often challenged with either managing fulltime course loads, funded positions (often accepted to boost their professional development and make them more desirable candidates for doctoral programs), and offcampus employment AND/OR incurring immense student loan debt. Since FY2018 until suddenly this year, graduate students were able to apply for \$1000 grants through the Washburn Transformational Experience program (e.g., to pay participants, for conference travel); however, that program cut this funding this year.
